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Executive summary

The Local Government Commission (LGC) ran this telephone survey in the Wairarapa to gauge public opinion on the options for changes to the structure of local government in the region.

There were three main objectives of the survey:

- Decide whether there is support for change
- If so, which option is preferred
- Measure how successful various engagement strategies have been

The report focuses on the opinions of Carterton, Masterton and South Wairarapa respondents.

Option testing

A majority (56%) of respondents said there needs to be a change in the way local government in the Wairarapa is organised. Carterton respondents were significantly less likely (46%) than the overall to feel the need for change while Masterton was more likely to want change; at 61%. Just under a third (31%) said there does not need to be change.

56% said there needs to be a change in the way local government in the Wairarapa is organised

52% prefer combining the three district councils

34% prefer no change

12% prefer combining all four councils

When asked whether they supported or opposed each option, over half (57%) said they support the three district councils combining into one council and have the Greater Wellington Regional Council (GWRC) remain separate, 34% would support no change and 27% would support combining all four councils. 46% opposed no change and 55% opposed combining all four councils.

After having heard the options and asked to pick one, preferences also followed this order with just over half preferring that the three district councils were combined, followed by no change, then combining all four.

The main factor given for those who said they prefer the three district councils were combined was not wanting to be combined with GWRC as Wellington and the Wairarapa have different needs.

The most cited reason for not wanting change was that the districts all have different needs that justify having separate councils.

An increase of efficiency and the districts being too small were the two main reasons for those who prefer all four councils combining into one.



Respondents were then asked about the specific options for how a two council system would work. Over half (55%) of the sample said they support the option where the GWRC responsibilities remain unchanged, and similar levels of support (53% each) was given for having one or two committees working with the councils. The final option of transferring responsibilities to the new Wairarapa Council had much less support at 29%.

26% prefer having a joint committee
24% prefer GWRC responsibilities remain the same
22% prefer having two committees
19% prefer transfer most of GWRC responsibilities to the new council

When asked to choose one of the four combined district council options, preferences were relatively evenly distributed amongst the four.

The dominant factor given for those who wanted one joint committee was that it would help the two councils work together.

Those who preferred that the GWRC responsibilities remain unchanged gave 'generally not wanting change' as their most frequently cited reason.

The dominant factor given by those who wanted two committees was that it would give the Wairarapa better representation.

More control for the Wairarapa was the reason most cited by people who prefer most of the GWRC responsibilities were transferred to the new Wairarapa Council.



Engagement

Almost two thirds (64%) of respondents said they were aware that the LGC was working with the Wairarapa community about the Wairarapa's local government arrangements. Of those who said they had heard of the work on council organisation almost half (44%) said it was through newspaper articles and another 19% said it was through newspaper advertisements.

Younger respondents (those under 30 years old) were far less likely to be aware of the LGC's work and were also less likely to declare having any knowledge of local government in the Wairarapa.

Half of respondents said they had heard about the options before and the main sources of information those people used to learn about the options was newspapers and brochures (30-31% each). Brochures and newspapers also rated highly as a useful way of getting the information and half the sample gave brochures as their preferred source to learn about local government arrangements.

Knowledge of local government.

48% said know 'a lot or a 'fair amount'51% said they know 'not that much' or 'hardly anything'

Knowledge of local government in the Wairarapa was mixed with 48% declaring they know 'a lot' or 'a fair amount' and 51% saying they know 'not that much' or 'hardly anything'. Ratings of the job the local government does in the Wairarapa were mostly neutral. A third (34%) said they do a good job, 12% said a poor job and 54% were in between or unsure. Carterton respondents gave a higher positive rating at 46%.



Methodology and Objectives

The Local Government Commission (LGC) ran this telephone survey in the Wairarapa to gauge public opinion on the options for changes to the structure of local government in the region.

There were three main objectives of the survey:

- Decide whether there is support for change
- If so, which option is preferred
- Measure how successful various engagement strategies have been

The report focuses on the opinions of Carterton, Masterton and South Wairarapa respondents.

Fieldwork was conducted from the 5th to the 9th of July 2016.

All fieldwork was conducted using the Quancept survey system which is a leading Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing system. It is known for its power and flexibility, as well as the ease of use for supervisors and interviewers. It works in conjunction with a fully customizable sample management system, as well as a predictive dialler.

The total sample size was n=500, The margin of error for a 50% figure at the 95% confidence level for a sample size of 500 is $\pm 4.4\%$.

Oversampling was done in Carterton and South Wairarapa Districts to increase accuracy in these smaller areas.

The option testing component of the report is to test public appeal of the six options available. To make the six options¹ more comprehensible in a telephone survey format the option were asked in two stages. The first stage tested the following three options:

- All four councils are combined into one Unitary Council (Option F)
- South Wairarapa, Carterton and Masterton District Councils are combined into one district council and the Greater Wellington Regional Council remains separate (Options B, C, D and E)
- The four existing councils remain unchanged (Option A)

The second stage tested the specific working of having a Wairarapa District Council separate from the Greater Wellington Regional Council:

- The Greater Wellington Regional Council responsibilities would remain completely unchanged (Option B)
- Create a Joint committee to work on environmental planning, between the two councils (Option C)
- Create TWO committees to ensure more Wairarapa input into environmental planning and Wairarapa services (Option D)
- Transfer most of the Greater Wellington Regional Council responsibilities to the new Wairarapa Council (Option E)

Option testing

1.1 Need for change

A majority (56%) of respondents said there needs to be a change in the way local government in the Wairarapa is organised, 13% were unsure and just under a third (31%) said there doesn't need to be change.

Carterton respondents were significantly less likely than the overall to support change at 46%. While not quite significant, Masterton appear somewhat more likely to want change at 61%.

People who declared awareness of the Local Government Commission's (LGC) work on the arrangements and those who said they had heard about the options before were significantly more likely to say there needs to be change at 65% and 67% respectively.

Likewise, people who declared high knowledge ('A lot' + 'A fair amount') of their local government were more likely to declare the need for change at 67% compared to those with less knowledge at 47%.

Respondents who said their local government does a good (1+2, on 1-5 rating) job were more likely to feel content with the way things were (47% for change). This may help to explain Caterton's lower desire for change as Carterton respondents had the highest rating for their local government.

Age was positively correlated with change. People under 30 years old at 32%, those between 30 and 59 at 57% and those 60 years old and over were at 66% for change. In part this is explained by people under 30 being more likely to say they were unsure whether there needs to be change or not (21%).

1.2 Main options

Respondents were given a brief description of the current status of the local government arrangements in the Wairarapa and then read out three different options and were asked to give each one a rating from of 1 to 5 where 1 means strongly oppose and 5 means strongly support. After hearing all three options they were then asked which one they preferred.

Overall the highest rated and top preferred option was for the three district councils to be combined and the Greater Wellington Regional Council (GWRC) to remain separate.

1.2.1 Total Ratings

The option that received the highest rating, 23% clear of second, was for the district councils to combine and for the GWRC to remain separate. Over half (57%) said they support (4+5) this option, 15% were neutral (3) and 27% opposed it (1+2). The next highest rated option was for no change at 34% support and just under half (46%) oppose. Last was for all four councils to combine which received support from about a quarter (27%) and was opposed by over half (55%) the sample.

Support rating for change of council organisation options

While the three districts did not show significant differences between the support ratings, there was some indication that Carterton had higher support for leaving the councils unchanged at 42%. This supports the findings of the overall question on the need for change.

1.2.2 Preferred option

Once they had been described the three options around half (52%) of respondents said they preferred the three district councils were combined, a third (34%) said they preferred that they stayed the same, only 12% wanted all four council combined and 2% were unsure.

There was some small variation within the three districts around whether they prefer no change or a combined Wairarapa District Council. However, all districts had more people preferring the combined district council than no change and all were united in not wanting all four councils combined.

Respondents who declared high knowledge ('A lot' + 'A fair amount') of the Wairarapa local government were more likely to prefer having a Wairarapa District Council (60%) and less likely to prefer no change (28%).

People under 30 years old were more likely to prefer no change (46%) than they were to prefer having a Wairarapa District Council (38%).

1.2.3 Reasons for preferred option

All four councils combined

The two driving reasons for those who said they prefer all four councils combining into one was the idea there would be an increase in efficiency (31%) and that the districts are too small to justify having their own councils (26%).

Other reasons given were that it would be having a stronger more united council (16%), make better use of resources (14%), simplicity (8%) and it would mean more support from Wellington in the region (8%).

The three district councils combined

The main factor given for those who said they prefer the three district councils were combined focused on not wanting to combine with Wellington as they are too different (35%). Efficiency and cost savings also featured strongly at 20%.

Other reasons included the districts being too small for their own councils (14%), more representations for the Wairarapa (14%), to have a stronger more united council (9%) and the concern Wellington would not give the Wairarapa a good deal if they were combined (9%).


Councils remain unchanged

The most cited reason given for leaving the councils as they are was the districts are too different to be combined (30%).

It is working well now (19%) was another strong reason followed by concern over under representation (14%), smaller councils work better with the community (11%), the cost of changing (8%) and concern that they would be paying for other districts issues (6%).




All four councils combined






District councils combined

1.3 Specific options

Respondents were asked to focus on the option of combining the three district councils into the Wairarapa District Council and then give their ratings, using a scale of 1 to 5 where 1 means strongly oppose and 5 means strongly support, on the four specific ways that might work. After rating each of those options they were then asked which they prefer.

The only option that received a clearly lower rating and preference was that of transferring most of the GWRC responsibilities to the new Wairarapa Council. The other three options were given very similar ratings and preference.

1.3.1 Total ratings

Over half (55%) of the sample said they support (4+5) the GWRC responsibilities remaining unchanged, and similar levels of support (53% each) was given for having a joint committee working between the councils and having two committees working with the councils. There was a small difference in the levels of people opposing (1+2) these three options with 23% opposing two committees, 19% opposing one committee and 17% opposing no committees.

The final option of transfer responsibilities to the new Wairarapa Council had much lower ratings at 29% support and 45% oppose.

Support rating for change of council organisation options

One of the options was to combine the three district councils into one council called the Wairarapa District Council and Greater Wellington Regional Council remain separate. There are four different ways this could work.

None of the districts showed greater or lesser interest in supporting the transfer of responsibilities from the GWRC and they all had similar ratings for the other three options within the margin of error.

1.3.2 Preferred option

Once they had been described four options, preferences were relatively evenly distributed amongst the four options. Just over a quarter (26%) went for one committee, just under a quarter (24%) went for GWRC responsibilities remaining unchanged, slightly less preferred two committees (22%), 19% preferred transferring responsibilities to the new council and 9% were unsure.

South Wairarapa showed a higher interest in having two committees to ensure more Wairarapa input into environmental planning and Wairarapa services (31%) and less interest in letting the GWRC responsibilities remain the same (17%).

People who had heard about the options before were more likely to prefer the GWRC responsibilities remain the same than those who had not heard the options before (28% and 18% respectively). While those who had not heard them before were more likely to pick having one joint committee over those who had heard the options (33% and 20% respectively).

1.3.3 Reasons for preferred option

GWRC responsibilities remain unchanged

The main factor given for the those who said the GWRC responsibilities should remain unchanged was that they generally did not want change at all (29%).

Other cited reasons included the differences being too great (19%), the idea this was the most cost effective option (15%), wanting to be separate from Wellington (10%), concern over the possibility of Wellington forgetting about them (8%) and that being the simplest option (7%).

One joint committee

The dominant factor given for the those who wanted one committee was that it would help the two councils work together and get the most out of their work (50%).

Other cited reasons included better representation (16%), being good for the environment (12%) and getting support from Wellington (9%).

Two committees

The dominant factor given for those who wanted two committees was that it would give Wairarapa better representation (47%).

Other cited reasons included better crossover and communication (15%), the idea this would help with the different issues and needs of the districts (13%) and two being better than one or none (8%).


Transfer majority of responsibilities to the new Wairarapa Council

The two driving reasons were for more Wairarapa control for the Wairarapa (41%) and that Wairarapa has different needs and issues than Wellington (32%).

Other lesser reasons were better representation (11%) and Wairarapa can be autonomous (7%).




GWRC responsibilities unchanged






One joint committee






Two committees

1.4 Combined preference

By taking the specific preferences of those who said they preferred the three district councils to combined and putting those against those who preferred the other two general options we can see the overall preferences of all seven options.

Remaining unchanged has the largest group of supporters (34%) of the six options. However, when looking at the ratings of the options, leaving the councils unchanged has the 4th highest level of support at 34%. Creating a Wairarapa District Council and leaving the GWRC responsibilities unchanged had the highest support at 55% closely followed by having one or two committees to work with the new Wairarapa Council and the GWRC (both at 53%).

Engagement

Declared awareness of the work the LGC has been doing was somewhat higher than the declared awareness of the options once respondents were told what they were. Newspapers featured strongly amongst the sources of information used when people heard about the work but slightly less so when asked about the details of the options. Newspapers and brochures were equally used in engagement on these details, however, brochures were picked more frequently as the most preferred source of information on Council arrangements.

Younger respondents (those under 30 years old) were far less likely to be aware of the work or the options and were also less likely to declare having any knowledge of local government in the Wairarapa. Their preferred source of information about arrangements was also brochures but was closely followed by the LGC website.

2.1 Awareness of LGC work on arrangements

2.1.1 Declared awareness

Almost two thirds (64%) of respondents said they were aware the LGC is working with the Wairarapa community about Wairarapa's local government arrangements.

Carterton had marginally higher declared awareness at 73% but this was not quite significantly different from the overall.

There was a stronger positive relationship with the age of the respondent and their declared awareness, 28% of people aged under 30 years old said they were aware, 55% of those between 30 and 44 years, 65% among those aged 45 to 59 and 84% for those 60 years old and over.

Education was also a factor. Those with up to secondary level qualifications had a declared awareness of 55% compared to those with a university level qualification on 74%.

2.1.2 Information channel

Of those who said they had heard of the work on council organisation almost half (44%) said it was through newspaper articles and another 19% said it was through newspaper advertisements. Via word of mouth and radio ads were also common at 14% and 11% respectively. Brochure, public meeting and council publication/website all had 7-8% of respondents declaring this method. Other sources included posters, the questionnaire, at work, drop in centre, email and the internet/social media (all 5% or less).

2.2 Previous awareness of the options

Half the sample had already heard about the options before, and the main sources of information those people used to learn about the options was newspapers and brochures. Brochures also rated highly as a useful way of getting the information and half the sample gave it as their preferred source.

Younger respondents were less likely to have heard about the options and more likely to suggest the LGC website as their preferred way of finding out about local government arrangements.

2.2.1 Declared awareness

After hearing about and giving ratings of the options respondents were asked whether they had heard about the options before. Exactly half of the sample said they had heard about the options before.

There were not any significant differences between the districts.

Similar to the previous awareness question, age was a strong factor. Respondents under 30 years old declared awareness at 28% compared to their older counter parts (60 years and over) at 63% awareness.

2.2.2 Information channel

Almost a third (31%) said they had learned about these options via the newspaper and another third (30%) said it was via a brochure. The next highest cited source was a public meeting (16%) then word of mouth (9%). The LGC website, at the respondent's work, and advertising/media generally all had about the same rating of 5-6%. Drop in centre and LGC posters only register at 2-3%.

2.2.3 Channel rating

Using a scale of 1 to 5 where 1 is not useful at all and 5 is very useful each source shows generally high useful ratings for the three most common sources of information. Three quarters (74%) of those who learned about the options via the newspaper said they found this option useful (4+5) and for those who learned about them through Brochures and Public meetings 66% for each said they found them useful. Other options (which had sample sizes too small to be meaningfully separate) had overall a useful rating of 64%.

2.2.4 Channel preference

Around half (51%) of respondents said they would prefer to get information on local government arrangements via a brochure. The LGC website and a public meeting were secondary at 17% and 12% respectively.

No respondent aged under 30 said a public meeting was their preferred method and they were much more likely to prefer the LGC website at 33%, but still behind brochures at 38%.

2.3 Opinion on local government in general

2.3.1 Knowledge

Knowledge of local government in the Wairarapa was mixed with 48% declaring they know 'a lot' or 'a fair amount' and 51% saying they know 'not that much' or 'hardly anything'.

No respondent under 30 years old said they knew 'a lot' about the local government and only 16% said they know 'a fair amount'. Older respondents (60 years and over) declare much higher knowledge at a total of 68%.

2.3.2 Rating

Ratings (using a scale of 1-5 where 1 means very poor and 5 means very good) of the job the local government does in the Wairarapa were mostly neutral as 47% gave a rating of 3 and 7% were unsure. A third (34%) said they do a good job (4+5) and 12% said a poor job (1+2).

Carterton was significantly more likely to give a positive rating than the overall at 46%.

About a fifth (19%) of people aged under 30 were unsure about what rating to give.

Those with knowledge ('a lot' + 'a fair amount') were much more likely to give a positive rating (43%) than their counter parts (23%).
